high		The sound is high pitched.
Hip Hop		a style of music similar to rap
imagination		To be able to create something.
Jazz		Black Americans invented it in the 1900s. Jazz players improvise and play syncopated rhythms.
low		The sound is low pitched.
rap		A style of music where words are said rapidly and rhythmically over an instrumental backing.
Reggae		A style of music that comes from Jamaica. It started in the 1960s. It has a strongly accented 'off' beat.
singers		A group of people who sing together.
song		A short poem or set of words which are sung.
waltz		a dance in ³ 4 time

major		A major musical interval, scale, key, or mode which is happy sounding.
minor		A minor musical interval, scale, key, or mode which is sad sounding.
melody		A sequence of single notes that makes a tune.
Musicals		A play in which singing and dancing play an essential part.
Opera		A play in which all the words are sung rather than spoken.
orchestra		A group of instrumentalists usually made up of string, woodwind, brass and percussion sections.
perform/performance		To play a piece of music in front of others.
percussion		A family of instruments that are beaten or shaken.
piano accompaniment		The piano is used to help the other performers e.g. the piano will

pitch		high and low sounds
Pop		Music that has been around since 1950s.
pulse		the regular heartbeat of the music; its steady beat
question and answer		An instrument or voice plays a short phrase which is the question, then

Rock		A form of popular music that evolved from rock and roll and pop music

rhythm		Long and short sounds or patterns that happen over the pulse.

Soul	A kind of music incorporating elements of rhythm and blues and gospel music, popularised by American black people.
tempo	the speed of the music; fast or slow or in-between
trumpet	a brass musical instrument
verse	A verse comes before or after the chorus section. The words of the verse change with each one.
