
KS1 Year A 2022 2023

 All children will have learned threading skills when in EYFS as well as folding paper to join 2 parts together to make a snake.








Judith Scott is a fibre artist.
This means she wraps lots of wool and thread around a frame to make models.





















- She was born in Chile, South America in 1948.

We will use all the skills we've learned to create a piece of art like this:





Who is Rachel Whiteread?

- An artist who makes 3D art, or 'sculpture'.
- Rachel Whiteread makes sculptures of the spaces underneath, around or in-between objects. Instead of copying what's there, she focuses on what isn't there! This is called negative space.
- She makes sculptures by pouring plaster inside objects, like a wardrobe, in a process called 'casting'.
- Rachel Whiteread was the first woman to be awarded the Turner prize, an important British art prize, in 1993.










- All children will have experienced colour mixing and collage by looking at Megan Coyle's work in EYFS.
- Some children will already be able to name the primary colours - red, yellow and blue. They will know which primary colours to mix to get the secondary colours of orange, green and purple.


Painting and Mixed Media: Life in Colour 2022 2023

Children will learn the following knowledge about colour mixing:




We may overlap materials of mix collage with painting techniques.

- ► He layered other materials on top of the collage paper.








Look at the shape of the character's eyes, eyebrows and mouth. These 3 facial features tell you a lot about how they are feeling.





Previous learning






