mixed media		Different materials e.g. collage, printing and painting all on 1 painting.			
monoprint		A form of printmaking where the image can only be made once.

dabbing paint		This brush stroke is used when you are adding texture. With a stiff bristle brush, use thick paint without added water in a pouncing motion. Dabbing can be done in multiple layers to build depth.	
detailed		A detail is an isolated element within a work of art, particularly from a painting or sculpture. If your drawing is detailed, you may have used lots of different types of lines to achieved texture.	
figurative		It is clearly derived from real object sources. The term is often in contrast to abstract art.	
formal		The formal elements of art are: colour, form, shape, line, pattern,
